Defibrillator maintenance should be regular to ensure it's ready to be used in an emergency.

While most Defibrillators perform routine self-testing, it is critical to visually inspect your unit regularly.

We recommend checking the First Aid status ready button every time you walk past the Defibrillator.

Each time after using your Defibrillator, you need to replace the pads with a new set and check the battery.
